### Communist Party General Secretary and President To Lam



General To Lam, born on July 10, 1957, hometown Hung Yen province, was unanimously re-elected General Secretary of the Communist Party of Vietnam on January 23, 2026.

On April 7, 2026, during the first session of the 16th National Assembly, the National Assembly approved a resolution electing General To Lam as President of the Socialist Republic of Vietnam for the 2026–2031 term. For the first time in modern Vietnamese political history, a leader has been re-elected as General Secretary of the Communist Party and assumed the office of President within the same year, concurrently holding both positions from the very beginning of his term.

He has been a member of the Party Central Committee across its 11th to 14th terms and has served on the Politburo since the 12th term. Academically, he holds a Doctorate in Law and is a professor, having graduated from the People’s Security University, one of Vietnam’s premier institutions for security and law studies.

After graduating from the People’s Security University, he began his career in 1979 at the Ministry of Public Security, advancing through roles in political protection and national security, including director-level positions and the ranks of Major General, Lieutenant General, Colonel General, and eventually General in January 2019. His leadership extended to positions such as Deputy Minister and Minister of Public Security, as well as Vice Head and then Head of the Central Steering Committee on Anti-Corruption, and Member of the National Defense and Security Council. During his tenure as Minister of Public Security (2016 – April 2024), he led a sweeping anti-corruption campaign that removed numerous high-level officials.

He initially assumed the role of Party General Secretary on August 3, 2024, following the death of his predecessor, Nguyen Phu Trong. In 2024, To Lam briefly served as President of Vietnam, and later as both President and General Secretary, before continuing as General Secretary from October 2024 onward. His career reflects decades of service in both security and political leadership at the highest levels of Vietnam’s government and Communist Party.

# Prime Minister

## H.E. Le Minh Hung



Le Minh Hung was elected as Prime Minister of Vietnam on April 7, 2026. He was born on December 11, 1970, in his hometown in Ha Tinh province. He is a prominent Vietnamese politician currently serving as Head of the Party Central Organization Commission. He has been a member of the Party Central Committee since its 12th term and has served on the Politburo since the 13th term.

He began his career in 1993 at the State Bank of Vietnam in the Department of International Relations, working on matters related to the International Monetary Fund (IMF). From 1998 to 2002, he held leadership roles in the Asian Development Bank unit within the bank, and later advanced to Deputy Director and then Director of the Department of International Cooperation. Between 2010 and 2011, he served as Director of the Department of Personnel and Organization, before being appointed Deputy Governor of the State Bank in 2011. From 2016 to 2020, Le Minh Hung served as Governor of the State Bank of Vietnam, overseeing national monetary policy and banking regulation. At age 46, he was the youngest governor in the bank's history.

Following his tenure at the central bank, he transitioned to Party administration, serving as Chief of the Party Central Office from 2020 to 2024. In May 2024, he was appointed Head of the Party Central Organization Commission, and in June 2024 he assumed the role permanently, directing the Party's personnel, organizational strategy, and cadre management. He has also been elected as a member of the 15th National Assembly. He was elected as Prime Minister on April 8, 2026.

Academically, he holds a Master's degree in Public Policy and a Bachelor's degree in French. He used to attend IMF's Market Economics and Financial Analysis course at Shanghai University of Finance and Economics in 1996, followed by a Master's program in Economics at Saitama University, Japan (1996–1997). He is the son of the late Senior Lieutenant General Lê Minh Hương, who served as Vietnam's Minister of Public Security from 1996 to 2002.

## Deputy Prime Minister

### H.E. Pham Gia Tuc



Pham Gia Tuc, born on May 22, 1965, in Nam Ninh, Ninh Binh is a Vietnamese politician currently serving as Deputy Prime Minister. He has been a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of Vietnam since the 13th Party Congress and is a member of the 14th and 15th National Assemblies. He holds a Master's degree in Public Administration Management, Bachelor's degrees in both Administration and Foreign Economics, and an advanced degree in political theory.

As of early 2026, Pham Gia Tuc is a member of the 14th Politburo, a member of the 14th Secretariat of the Party Central Committee, and the Chief of the Party Central Committee Office. He also serves as the Standing Deputy Head of the Central Steering Committee for Science, Technology, Innovation, and Digital Transformation Development, and is a delegate to the 16th National Assembly.

Previously, he served as the Vice Chairman of the Vietnam Chamber of Commerce and Industry (VCCI) until 2015. From March 2014 to December 2017, the Politburo rotated and mobilized him to serve as Deputy Secretary of the Can Tho City Party Committee, a position he held across the 2010–2015 and 2015–2020 terms. He was appointed by the Secretariat as Deputy Head of the Central Internal Affairs Commission. In June 2020, he became Secretary of the Party Committee of the Central Internal Affairs Commission agency for the 2020–2025 term.

In 2021, he was elected as a member of the 13th Party Central Committee at the 13th National Party Congress and Secretary of the Nam Dinh Provincial Party Committee for the 2020–2025 term. Pham Gia Tuc was appointed by the Politburo as Deputy Chief of the Party Central Committee Office in 2024, then promoted to Chief of the Party Central Committee Office in 2025.

On January 22, 2026, he was elected as a member of the 14th Party Central Committee at the 14th National Party Congress and to the Politburo at the First Conference of the 14th Party Central Committee.

In April, 2026, he was elected as Standing Deputy Prime Minister.

## Deputy Prime Minister

### H.E. Ho Quoc Dung



Ho Quoc Dung, born on August 1, 1963, with hometown in Gia Lai (former Binh Dinh Province). He has been a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of Vietnam since the 13th Party Congress. He holds a Master's degree in Law and a Bachelor's degree in Legal Studies specializing in Judicial Cadre Training.

He began his career in 1990 as a specialist at the Department of Justice of Binh Dinh Province, where he served as Party Committee member and Secretary of the Youth Union Branch. From 1996 to 2004, he worked in the Office of the Binh Dinh Provincial People's Committee, serving as internal affairs specialist, Secretary to the Chairman of the Provincial People's Committee, and later

Deputy Chief of the Office and Deputy Secretary of its Party Committee.

From 2004 to 2009, he held several provincial leadership positions, including Vice Chairman of the Phu Cat District People's Committee, Deputy Chief and Chief of the Binh Dinh Provincial Party Committee Office, and Deputy Head of the National Assembly Delegation of Binh Dinh Province, while becoming a member and later permanent member of the Standing Committee of the Provincial Party Committee.

Between 2009 and 2014, he served as Vice Chairman and then Permanent Vice Chairman of the Binh Dinh Provincial People's Committee. From 2014 to 2020, he was Deputy Secretary of the Provincial Party Committee and Chairman of the Binh Dinh Provincial People's Committee. In October 2020, he became Secretary of the Binh Dinh Provincial Party Committee and later Chairman of the Provincial People's Council.

Following the 13th Party Congress in 2021, he became a member of the Party Central Committee. In July 2025, he was assigned as Secretary of the Gia Lai Provincial Party Committee, before being appointed Deputy Prime Minister of Vietnam on October 25, 2025; and then for the 2026-2031 term in April 2026.

## Deputy Prime Minister

H.E. Pham Thi Thanh Tra



Pham Thi Thanh Tra, born on January 21, 1964, hometown Nam Yen Commune, Nam Dan District, Nghe An Province (now Van An Commune, Nghe An Province), currently serves as Deputy Prime Minister of Vietnam. She is a member of the 12th, 13th, and 14th Party Central Committees, a member of the Standing Committee of the Government Party Committee, and a Member of the 15th National Assembly. She holds a Bachelor's degree in Literature, a Master's degree in Educational Management, and advanced-level political theory.

She began her public service career in the education sector in the late 1990s, serving as Deputy Head of the Tran Yen District Department of Education and Training (1997–1999), before moving into district leadership as Vice Chairwoman of the Tran Yen District People's Committee (1999–2000). She later advanced through youth and Party organizations, becoming Secretary of the Yen Bai Provincial Youth Union (2002–2006) and Head of the Provincial Party Committee's Propaganda Department (2006–2008). From 2008 to 2014, she held senior provincial executive and Party roles, including Vice Chairwoman of the Yen Bai Provincial People's Committee and Secretary of the Yen Bai City Party Committee.

From 2014 to 2020, she served as Deputy Secretary and then Secretary of the Yen Bai Provincial Party Committee, concurrently holding posts as Chairwoman of the Provincial People's Committee and later Chairwoman of the Provincial People's Council. She transitioned to central government in 2020, serving as Deputy Head of the Central Organization Commission and Vice Minister of Home Affairs, before becoming Minister of Home Affairs (2021–January 2025). In October 2025, she was approved by the National Assembly and appointed to serve as Deputy Prime Minister of Vietnam for the 2021–2026 term and then for the 2026-2031 term in April 2026.

## Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defense

### General Phan Van Giang



General Phan Van Giang, born on October 4, 1960, hometown in Nam Dinh (now Ninh Binh province), is a senior Vietnamese military officer and politician currently serving as Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defense, and is a member of the National Election Council. He has been a member of the Party Central Committee from its 12<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> terms and a member of the Politburo since the 13<sup>th</sup> term. He holds a Doctorate in Military Science.

He began his military career in 1978 as a soldier in Battalion 4, Regiment 677, Division 346, participating in combat operations in Cao Bang. Over the following decades, he rose through the ranks of the People's Army of Vietnam, holding key command and staff positions including Company Commander, Battalion Chief of Staff, Regiment Commander, and Division Commander in Division 312 of Military Corps 1 of Vietnam People's Army. From 2010 to 2011, he served as Commander of Military Corps 1, before becoming Deputy Chief of the General Staff (2011–2014) and Deputy Minister of Defense (2016).

From 2016 to 2021, he was Chief of the General Staff of the Vietnam People's Army while also serving as Deputy Minister of Defense. In April 2021, he was appointed Minister of National Defense, overseeing Vietnam's military strategy, defense policy, and national security.

He was re-elected as member of the 14<sup>th</sup> Politburo in January 2026. In April, 2026, he was elected as Deputy Prime Minister.

## Deputy Prime Minister

**H.E. Nguyen Van Thang**



Nguyen Van Thang, born on September 12, 1973, in My Dinh, Hà Nội, is a Vietnamese politician currently serving as Deputy Prime Minister. He has been a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of Vietnam since the 13<sup>th</sup> Party Congress and is a member of the 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> National Assembly. He holds degrees from the College of Banking, a Bachelor's in Foreign Languages, a Bachelor's in Finance, and a PhD in Economics.

He began his career in 1996 at VietinBank Ba Dinh Branch and later became Secretary to the General Director in 2000. From 2003, he served as Deputy Chief of Office of VietinBank. Between 2006 and 2009, he served as Deputy Head and later Head of the Large Corporate Client Department at VietinBank. From 2011 to 2014, he served as General Director of VietinBank and then became Chairman of the Board of Directors of VietinBank.

After working at Vietinbank, he served as Vice Chairman of the Quang Ninh People's Committee from 2018 and later served as Chairman of the Quang Ninh People's Committee from 2019. In October 2020, he was elected Secretary of the Điện Biên Provincial Party Committee for the 2020–2025 term. At the 13<sup>th</sup> National Party Congress in 2021, he was elected Member of the Party Central Committee.

From October 2022 to November 2024, he served as Minister of Transport. In November 2024, the National Assembly approved his appointment as Minister of Finance for the 2021–2026 term.

In April, 2026, he was elected as Deputy Prime Minister.

## Deputy Prime Minister

### H.E. Le Tien Chau



Le Tien Chau, born on October 5, 1969, in Long Chu, Tay Ninh, is a Vietnamese politician currently serving as Deputy Prime Minister. He has been a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party of Vietnam in the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> tenures, and a deputy to the 15<sup>th</sup> National Assembly. He holds a PhD in Law.

After graduating from the Ho Chi Minh City University of Law, from 1994 to 2009, he served as a lecturer at the institution. In early 2010, he was appointed Deputy Director, Deputy Head of the Southern Representative Office of the Ministry of Justice, and in 2012 he became the Director and the Head of Southern Representative Office. From 2014 to 2016, he worked as Director of the Department of Personnel Organization of the Ministry of Justice, before serving as Deputy Minister of Justice.

From 2018 to 2020, he served as Deputy Secretary of the Hau Giang Provincial Party Committee cum Chairman of the People's Committee of Hau Giang Province. Between 2020 and 2021, he was Secretary of the Hau Giang Provincial Party Committee. In June 2021, he was appointed Deputy Secretary of the Party Committee of the Vietnam Fatherland Front and subsequently served as Vice Chairman and General Secretary of the Central Committee of the Front for the 2019 - 2024 term.

In January 2023, he was assigned to be the Secretary of the Hai Phòng City Party Committee for the 2020 - 2025 term. After the city of Hai Phong merged with Hai Dương, he was appointed as the Secretary of the Hai Phong City Party Committee.

In January 2026, at the 14<sup>th</sup> National Congress of the Communist Party of Vietnam, he was elected as a Member of the Central Party Committee. He was appointed as Deputy Prime Minister by the National Assembly in April 2026.

## Chairman of the 16<sup>th</sup> National Assembly

### H.E. Tran Thanh Man



Tran Thanh Man, born on August 12, 1962, hometown Can Tho Province, has been serving as Chairman of the National Assembly since May 2024 and Chairman of the National Election Council. He has been a member of the Communist Party Central Committee from its 10<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> terms and has served on the Politburo since the 13<sup>th</sup> term. He holds a Doctorate in Economics.

Tran Thanh Man began his political career in youth and local government organizations in the Southern Hau Giang and Can Tho provinces, advancing through leadership positions including Chairman of the People's Committee of Can Tho City (2008–2010) and Can Tho province's Party Secretary (2011-2015). He later held senior roles in the Vietnam Fatherland Front, serving as Vice Chairman, Secretary-General, and Chairman. From 2019 to 2021, he was Vice Chairman of the National Assembly, before being elected its Chairman in May 2024. In 2025, he also became Chairman of the National Election Council, reflecting his central role in both legislative leadership and the organization of Viet Nam's elections.

At the first session of the 16<sup>th</sup> National Assembly, held on April 6, 2026, Trần Thanh Mẫn was appointed Chairman of the National Assembly.
